Attendees rekindled friendships and reminisced their adventures and antics of school days at the longest surviving inland town of North Queensland.

Representatives from the Charters Towers Regional Council attended including the then Mayor Frank Beveridge. Adding to the success was Ravenswood Restoration and Preservation Association organising a bus for the Ravenswood pioneers to travel from Townsville. Ravenswood Gold provided the delicious lunch and sponsored the *Amazing Historic Race of Ravenswood State School* encompassing a fun interactive tour of the school, with challenges along the way. Home and Heritage

History of Ravenswood School

Ravenswood was gazetted as a town in 1871 after a tent settlement sprang up on the discovery of gold in 1868. As more families moved into the town, the need for a school was soon apparent which coincided with Queensland becoming the first colony to provide free primary education from January 1870.

In 1872, a Ravenswood School Committee was formed and tenders were called to build a school to meet the needs of the growing community. The government expected townships with more than 30 potential pupils to put up a third of the school costs. The School Committee valiantly raised £306/18/-. With disagreement between the Committee and the government regarding the building plans, the Committee purchased the old 'Emerald Isle Hotel' for the modest sum of £18 as a temporary location. Children started attending classes in October 1883, while the two-classroom school and residence were completed. Students moved to the newly built school in January 1874 with an enrolment of 70 students. In 1889, the school reached its peak enrolment of almost 400 children. The school was extended in 1905 and consisted of eight classrooms and a gymnasium.


Mining in Ravenswood enjoyed a boom between 1900 and 1908 as more modern techniques were applied to ore processing. However, as mining costs rose, returns fell. After the end of the First World War, it became apparent that the field would not pick up again. In the 1920s people moved away from Ravenswood and buildings were relocated to other towns. As the population declined, some of the school buildings were progressively removed from the town.

In the late 1970's, exploration recommenced over leases and the modern Ravenswood mine was established in 1978, reigniting town activity. In 2019 Government approval was given to expand the gold mine processing plant and recommence open pit mining of Buck Reef West. This required the school to be relocated. A decision was made to retain the two buildings of heritage significance; the original 1873 school room and residence, thought to be the oldest surviving house in North Queensland. These two buildings sit proudly alongside the new school buildings on Elphinstone Street, and continue to support the education of the children in Ravenswood.



ANZAC Day Service

The ANZAC Day Dawn Service has become an integral part of honouring service women and men in Ravenswood. Ravenswood Community Heath Support

Ravenswood Gold provides health services to the community within the limitations of the Ravenswood Gold clinical health team. These limitations are due to recent government directives, and the mine's duty of care for the health and safety of Ravenswood Gold employees. To ensure good health care for our community, in an emergency situation, please dial Triple 000 to enable Queensland Fire and Emergency Service (QFES) and/or the Queensland Ambulance Service (QAS) to assess the situation and send a vehicle. QAS and/or QFES can call on the fully trained Mine personnel to respond to your **emergency** until they arrive. The Mine Site Nurse and/or ERT will attend emergency callouts day and night, as requested by the QAS. Emergency callouts involve situations such as:

- Trauma incidents (fractures, spinal injury, eye injury)
- Unconsciousness from neurological conditions (strokes, seizure)
- Substance abuse or accidental poisoning
- Unrelieved chest pain of greater than 15mins duration
- Uncontrolled haemorrhage conditions

- Respiratory distress
- Resuscitation cases
- Anaphylaxis
- Diabetic emergency
- Snake bites
- Mental health crisis

In non-emergency situations, you can speak with a medical doctor any time of the day or night by calling the Royal Flying Doctor Service on 1300 MY RFDS (1300 69 7337). A doctor will advise on how to treat the condition and when required, RFDS will contact the Mine Site Nurse to provide support. Please be aware there is no rostered nightshift nurse so calling the RFDS will help to manage the fatigue wellbeing for the day shift nurse, particularly if your non-emergency medical condition is after hours.
